Frog Lake Trip Report ~ July 5-7, 2002

Betsy and Tim Adkison and Mark, Donna, Heyburn, and Tyler Whitham loaded up their gear and headed out of Idaho Falls in search of cooler weather at Frog Lake in the White Cloud mountains. At the trailhead near Livingston Mill the sun was high and hot. Hiking up the trail

through sage brush and pine trees we looked at paintbrush, arnica, penstemon, scarlet gilia, butter

and eggs (kind of look like snap dragons) and cinquefoil. The hike follows a well-graded trail that switch backs up to a 9600-foot pass. Views of the White Cloud and Lost River ranges are breathtaking. As the trail descended to Frog Lake we paused to admire Castle Peak, Merriam Peak, Serette Ridge, and Granite Peak. Flowers along the trail included silky phacelia, flax, sulfur flower, and more of the varieties observed earlier. A campsite overlooking Frog Lake and a flower filled meadow was quickly chosen. Rising early we went for a day hike to tour the Boulder Chain lakes. Stream crossings were challenging with wobbly wet logs, rocks under water, and horseflies wickedly determined to chew on us at critical moments. Heyburn and Tyler got to splash their way across the creeks and the little showers they willingly provided were welcome in the heat. Lunch was eaten at Hourglass Lake. The weekend was relaxing and fun with great company. The mosquitoes were fierce and even Heyburn and Tyler appreciated occasional squirts of bug dope. We observed how dry the trails are, the meadow we camped by is usually ratherboggy, the lack of snow on the pass, the dried up little ponds, that even Castle Peak was lacking its usual amount of snow, and the flowers blooming were more typical of the flowers that would be blooming closer to late August. It is really dry in our mountains this year so everyone needs to be careful out there. drw/^/

Womens Annual Backpack Trip Report: July 13-14, 2002

100 degree plus temperatures, leeches, and ferocious horsefly's and deerflys were no match for the 3 of us brave enough to hike into Hidden Lake on the west slope of the Tetons. Betsy Adkison, Michelle Fox, and Donna Whitham left the car at the Bitch Creek trailhead at the crack of noon. There was an abundance of flowers along the trail to identify, quiz each other about, and photograph. Especially, the flowers in the shade. Delicate butterflies feasting on the flowers. Western Tanagers high in the trees serenaded us as we hiked along. When we arrived at the designated campsite a quarter mile beyond

Hidden Lake we were dismayed to find that the party ahead of us had left the camp in terrible shape with slices of bread scattered here there and every where. Piles of horse manure, quite fresh, laid everywhere we would have liked to camp. Being as the area is considered prime grizzly and black bear habitat, we found another place to camp closer to the lake. The fish in Hidden Lake are quite hefty in size but do require a Wyoming license to fish for them. Betsy and Donna stood in the lake to pumped and slapped flies. Michelle braved the leeches to swim to the middle of the lake. A nice breeze kept the bugs at bay during happy hour and dinner on the lake shore. Square ice-cream in Swan Valley topped off the weekend.

Oliver Peak Trip Report ~ July 21, 2002

Gaining about 2300 feet in 4 miles the Oliver Peak trail climbs steeply in some areas but is mostly a nice moderate grade all the way to the top of the peak. Clouds over the Grand Teton partly obscured the view but we had a marvouls view of the Snake River Range, the Big Holes, and the north end of the Palisades Creek. Lupine, cow parsnip, larkspur, cinquefoil, evening campion, wild carrot, sticky gerainiums, and penstiman were amongst the multitude of flowers dotting the ridgetop meadows. Garney Hardy and Paul Worth joined Mark, Donna, Heyburn, and Tyler Whitham for the enjoyable hike all of us had to the top of Oliver Peak. Dinner at the Angus Cafe in Swan Valley completed the trip.
