IDAHO ALPINE CLUB GENERAL MEETING

"Idaho Roadless Areas" WEDNESDAY, FEBRUARY 6, 2008, 7:30 PM IDAHO FALLS LIBRARY

Idahoans love the open space that our state provides. The quality of life in Idaho is in large part defined by the abundant opportunity for outdoor recreation. The state of Idaho has more public land and wilderness than any other state with the exception of Alaska. Idaho also has 9.3 million acres of land designated as Roadless Areas, lands that are accessed by trails only. Marv Hoyt and Kit McGurn from the Greater Yellowstone Coalition will host a lecture and discussion regarding the status of Roadless Areas on Idaho's public lands, and what they mean for Idaho's heritage and future. Topics will revolve around the history of the Roadless Rule and the unique qualities of Idaho's Roadless Areas. The recent move by Idaho State to petition for changes in the management of Idaho's roadless lands will also be examined. This is a great opportunity to learn more about the wildest parts of Idaho and to prepare for the public hearing to be held on Wednesday, February 20th in Idaho Falls on the Idaho Roadless Management Plan.

Remember to take the ten essentials whenever you go into the backcountry. You never know what the weather will bring in the local mountains, be prepared. Check the avalanche conditions before you go. There are websites listed in this bulletin where you can check the current conditions. Lastly don't forget your avalanche beacon, shovel, and probe if you are going to be in steep terrain even if the avalanche forecast is low. Taking the proper equipment with you and knowing how to use it will make your trip in the backcountry more comfortable and can save lives.

Enough about safety, I would like to thank a number of club members for their time and efforts over the last year. First, the activity coordinators and anyone else that took the time to lead a trip last year, thank you. You are the people that make this club work. Remember anyone can lead a trip, just call the activity coordinator with your idea for a trip and they will tell you how. Trip Reports

December 2 XCSki/Ricks Basin: Susan McKinley, Rod Metcalf, Donna and Mark Whitham, and Judy Williams met at Starbucks to fortify for a cold, windy day of XC skiing on the Nordic trails in Ricks Basin at Grand Targhee Resort. Bob and Marie Tyler met us at the ski area. We skied most of the 10 miles of groomed trails that range from beginner to advanced. At the end of the day Garney Hardy, Jo Ann Sherwin, and Paul Worth compared notes with us in the day lodge. The consensus was that the skiing had been fabulous irregardless of the somewhat marginal snow conditions.

December 9 Snowshoe/XCSki/ Annual Christmas Tree Hunt: Barbara Brown, Garney Hardy, Ken & Sammy Krivanek, Colleen Thompson, Donna & Mark Whitham, and Paul Worth went in search for the perfect tree in the Big Holes. Snow gently fell on us as we tromped through the woods, up and down ridges, and gullies, scrutinizing and way pointing At last, the potential candidates. perfect trees were found, felled by the mighty saw, tagged, wrapped in plastic, and hauled up and down those same ridges and gullies back to the cars. January 5 XCSki / Brimstone Trails: There are 9 miles of trail in this area that offer views of the Island Park Reservoir, Box Canyon, and the Buffalo River. Karl Bohan, Garney Hardy, Carolyn and Ken Katsma, Ken Krivanek, Donna Nicklaus, Sandy Pew, Colleen Thompson, Donna and Mark Whitham, and Paul Worth braved the wind and snow to explore 6.5 miles of the Brimstone trails. Strong winds and heavy snow over night had completely made a mess of the trails which had been set on Friday morning by the Forest Service groomer. Regardless of having to break trail both ways, skiing the fresh snow was like skiing on velvet, skiing up several of the hills was actually easier and the Eagle loop was pleasantly slow. We were glad the trails had been packed because any time we moved off of the depression for the trail, we were pretty much thigh deep. Through the spindrift, we did spot a Kingfisher

whipped about by the wind while trying to dive for fish, a Bald Eagle soaring high above the tree tops, Mountain and Blackcap Chickadees flitting in the trees, Mallards, Barrows Goldeneyes, Ringnecks, and the requisite Trumpeter Swans in the river. The fireplace and hot soup at Pond's Lodge at the end of the day was quite enjoyable too.

January 6 XCSki/Harriman State Park: More snow fell overnight and during the day on Sunday, while Garney Hardy, Ken Krivanek, Donna and Mark Whitham, and Paul Worth skied 5 of the over 10 miles of trails at Harriman State Park. Again we had to break trail due to the weather conditions. We pretty much had the park to ourselves even though the wind had died down quite substantially by Sunday morning. Lunch was in the patrol hut near Golden Lake while we warmed up in front of the little wood stove. The birds were hiding from the weather although we did see an American Dipper bobbing up and down in one small body of water and a few swan blobs trying to stay warm on the ice covering the river next to the Henry's Fork trail.

Trail Etiquette & Safety

- Be considerate of other traffic on all trails
- · Yield to skiers on a downhill run.
- Make every effort to clear the trail if you stop or fall.
- Do not walk or snowshoe on either skier set or machine set ski tracks on marked ski trails. Note: Skiers may choose to skin up or run down a snowshoe track that is marked or may even parallel a ski trail to avoid breaking trail but that is their choice.
- Ski under control always; avoid trails that are beyond your ability.
- Register your trip at the trail sign-in locations; use trail maps and signs to plan your trip.
- Let someone know where you will be and when you expect to return before leaving town. Then stick to those plans.
- Ski with a partner, especially on the ungroomed trails and back country ski runs.
- Make it a habit to carry the 10 "E's"; extra gear, water, snacks, flashlight, a compass and or a GPS (with extra batteries), trail or area maps, a cell phone (very poor reception if any except for on the ridge tops in most areas), and fire starting tools, even on short trips.
- Be aware that trail conditions can change greatly with changing snow, trail and weather conditions.
- Watch for and yield to trail grooming equipment.
- Keep your dogs under control (leash or in your immediate line of sight) and off of groomed tracks, and clean their refuse from the trail. Remember even other dog lovers do not care for someone else's dog showing up unsupervised, ill mannered, and leaving refuse in the trail
