IDAHO ALPINE CLUB GENERAL MEETING SKIING AROUND THE WIND RIVERS WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 6, 2010 @ 7:00 PM IDAHO FALLS LIBRARY

When it comes to skiing, Teton Valley resident Bob Stevenson thinks outside the box. Bob and some friends were planning a ski trip around the Wind River Mountains in March, 2007 when he and his friends decided to use skate skis instead of backcountry skis for their 150 to 200 mile journey. The key to making the trip possilbe with skate skis was their decision to use the Continental Divide Snowmobile Route from Togwotee Pass through Pinedale and Boulder and on to Lander. Five people, including Bob, skied the entire route which took four days while four other people joined them for parts of the route. Participants included Jackson Hole High School Nordic Coach Walt Berling and Jim Roscoe, a Wyoming state legislator for Teton, Sublette and Lincoln counties. While snowmobile and vehicle support carried food and sleeping bags for the skiers and the group stayed at private ranches at night, the trip was still not for the faint of heart. The trip required strenuous Nordic skiing of 40 plus miles a day through remote country with as much as 3,000 to 4,000 feet of elevation gain in a day and crossed the continental divide three times. Contrary to what one would expect, the group encountered only four snowmobiles during the entire trip. Come and enjoy Bob's slides of this unique and interesting adventure through Wind River country.

The meeting is open to the public and all outdoor enthusiasts are invited to attend.

October 22-24: City of Rocks Club Camp-Out - Celebrate 50 Years with a Moon Dance

The City of Rocks National Reserve unique geologic area became a landmark in 1843 for California-bound emigrants. They left wagon ruts across the landscape and their signatures in axle grease on Register Rock, Camp Rock and many others.

A few granite pinnacles and monoliths are in excess of sixty stories tall and 2.5 billion years old. The smooth granite faces offer exceptional rock climbing. Today, over 700 climbing routes have been identified.

In addition to climbing, over 22 miles of hiking trails traverse City of Rocks National Reserve, leading to arches, windows and dramatic overlooks. Trails vary from level and easy to steep and strenuous. Maps can be acquired at the visitor center. There is also superb bird watching, bicycling, and exploring nearby Castle Rocks State Park. Weather in October can be warm in the daytime and crisp at night.

We are planning a club camp-out at the City, for IAC club members, during the full moon. The IAC will be paying for one of the group sites or several campsites together depending on the number of club members planning to go. One of the nights will be a potluck. BYOB. Bring finger foods, salads, or desserts to share. Otherwise everyone will be on their own for feeding themselves. Come out, enjoy some great climbing at the City of Rocks and/or Castle Rocks, howl at the moon, and swap some stories.

Caribou-Targhee Maps on Line

Most of the Palisades and Teton Ranger District color topographic maps on the Caribou-Targhee National Forest web site have been revised to reflect trail number, trail route and trail use changes. Many of the Palisades district trails have been recently GPSed and so the maps are now considerably more accurate. There are 11 maps at a scale of 1:112,500 covering both ranger districts and 13 more detailed maps (hiking scale, 1:50,000) covering popular trails. All maps are Acrobat format and can be printed at home.
