Birds of Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve

Wednesday, September 7, 2005 - 7:30 PM ~Idaho Falls Library

Idaho Alpine Club's September meeting program will be presented by Mike Munts, from Craters of the Moon National Monument and Preserve. Mike will present a slide show on fall bird watching at the preserve. Birds are some of the most noticeable animals at Craters of the Moon. To date, 207 species have been sighted on or over the monument and preserve. Many of these are rocky area or shrub land specialists seen in large numbers in only a few other places in the country. Birds at the park include year round residents, those migrating south, species that stop there only a few days each year, and some arctic and alpine birds that stay for the winter.

Craters of the Moon is located approximately 84 miles west of Idaho Falls on Highway 20/26/93.

Mt. Moran - Climbing Helmet Saves Life:

If anyone needs a reminder to wear their climbing helmet: On August 6, member Jerry Painter was hit on the head by a melon size rock while ascending the first pitch of the CMC route on Mt. Moran. The rockfall broke Painter's helmet, and he sustained injuries to his head and neck. The injury resulted in Jerry being airlifted off of the mountain. Jerry says he is recovering slowly. His head seems to be okay now but his back and legs are still not working right. The park report states that while Jerry did sustain serious injuries, his use of a helmet—combined with a rapid evacuation—likely saved his life.

Trip Reports

8/12-14/2005: Independence Lakes:

From the top of Mount Independence one can see the Sisters and Bath Rock at the City of Rocks to the south, Mount Harrison to the north, Oakley to the west, and Cache Peak to the east.

Independence Lakes form a string of 4 shimmering jewels situated in a small cirque high on Independence Mountain. Cache Peak and Mount

Independence form the impressive ridge above the lakes. Friday night the 6 of us met at the trail head campground, to camp overnight, for an early start on Saturday morning.

Saturday, after our morning Starbucks, we began making our way up the trail. Western Coneflowers, Monkshood, Yarrow, Pink Monkey flower, Horsemint, Goldenrod, and Hellbore lined the sides of the trail. After a pleasant climb which switchbacks through aspens and subalpine fir trees, we arrived at the second of the lakes, 3.7 miles from the trail head. Camp was next to a lovely meadow with Rockmat, alpine sized Seago Lilies, Lupine, and Penstamen bravely growing despite the amount of traffic the lakes receive. A climb to the upper lakes gave us a chance to relax in the sun, swim, boulder on the huge granite boulders on the shores, and ice for happy hour. To top off dinner and celebrate a birthday, Mark cooked yummy Fry Brownies for all of us. The young men camped next to us entertained us while watching them attempt to cook a fish on a stick over a campfire, then losing it into the fire.

Sunday morning, we arose and cooked breakfast while it was still cool out. Garney opted to hike around the lake while the rest of us made our way up a rock filled steep gully to gain the ridge and then the summit of Mount Independence at 9,953 feet. Krumholtz on the ridge shows how rough the winters are there.

Cache Peak at 10,339 feet is the tallest peak south of the Snake River in Idaho. It is a bit more of a challenge to summit due to the dense vegetation nearly to the top of the peak. There is a summit register and survey marker on its summit. Rather than go down Mount Independence the way we came up, we decided to continue down the other side of the summit and climb down a different rock filled steep gully to the upper lakes. Garney had started back to the trailhead by the time we arrived back in camp. We finished breaking camp and hiked out in record time. It was a fun and enjoyable weekend for all of us.

NOTICE: THIS DOCUMENT IS A LEGALLY BINDING CONTRACT LIMITING YOUR RIGHTS TO RECOVER FOR INJURY AND LOSS!

By signing this document, you waive rights to bring any legal claim to recover compensation or obtain any other remedy for injury to or death of yourself, your spouse, your children or others and for loss of or damage to property however caused, arising out of the tortious acts of the officers or agents of Idaho Alpine Club (hereinafter IAC), now or any time in the future, whether caused by negligence or otherwise.

- 1. Definitions.** Herein IAC means Idaho Alpine Club, its officers, agents, activity coordinators and trip coordinators. "I" means the undersigned member, all my heirs and the members of my family, including any minors whether or not accompanying me and my personal representative, executors and administrators.
- 2. Acknowledgment of Risk.** I hereby acknowledge and agree that the activities of the IAC are frequently inherently dangerous and have a high degree of risk. I acknowledge that by execution hereof, **I am waiving and releasing all claims against the IAC for any injury whatsoever.** I agree to participate as a common adventurer, sharing the expenses for the activity and being personally responsible for my own safety and not looking to any others to protect me from harm.
- 3. Release and Waiver of All Claims and Covenant Not to Sue.** In consideration of participation in the activities of the Idaho Alpine Club by me, by my spouse, children or other dependents, I irrevocably waive and release the IAC and the owners of all equipment used in the IAC's common adventures from, and WAIVE MY SUBSTANTIAL RIGHT TO ASSERT ANY CAUSE OF ACTION, CLAIM OR DEMANDS OF ANY NATURE WHATSOEVER, including but not limited to, any claim of negligence, which I may have or acquire in the future against the IAC on account of personal injury, property damage, death, or accident of any kind, arising out of my involvement in the Idaho Alpine Club activities, however the injury or damage is caused, including, but not limited to, the negligence of the IAC. I contractually release the IAC and agree to hold the IAC harmless from any and all liability for any claims demands damages, actions, causes of action or suits of any kind or nature whatsoever, which result or may result in the future from activities sponsored by the IAC or coordinated by the Idaho Alpine Club members. This release applies to all club activities in the future in which I may participate. This release shall be effective and apply to all my heirs and the members of my family, including any minors whether or not accompanying me and my personal representative, executors and administrators.
- 4. Statement of Capacity and Understanding.** I will not undertake any activity of the Idaho Alpine Club without becoming fully aware of the nature and extent of the risks inherent therein. By participation, I am voluntarily assuming the risks. I will not engage in the activities unless I am in good health and I have no physical limitations which would preclude my safe participation. I understand I am responsible for my own instruction in safety and providing for my own safety. I am of lawful age (18 years or older) and otherwise legally competent to sign this agreement. I understand that the terms of this agreement are legally binding, and I am signing this agreement, after having carefully read it, having full time to carefully consider it, of my own free will.
